Farming Made Easy: Farmers who can remember forty years ago must be somewhat amazed at the progress made in agricultural implements and the labor of the farm. Only think of the wooden mould-board for the plow! the BEANS, PEAS, common tooth-harrow, the hay-shelvings made of fence-rails for a cart and the wide dangerous skeleton for the wagon; the hoe that was used, the two-pronged manure fork, and the whisky consumed by harvest hands! The reapers with their sickles, with which we nearly severed a finger, and the mark of the wound is as destinct to-day as then: the innovating "cradle" with its grand swing; the old rigid horse-rake, then a novelty; and the old log roller, which not more than one farmer in twenty could boast of; the lumbering grain fan, &c.

Now we have everything on a different seale, relieving the agricultural muscle from many a strain. We commence with the reaping machine, taking many years to perfect it; then the mowing machine, which was a still greater euriosity; then the combined mower and reaper; then the power thresher; and winnower; then the revolving horse-rake, then two or three other kind of horse-rakes, each allowing the driver to ride, almost like a jockey; then the horsepower hay-fork; then the hay-tredder .--The old harrow gave way to the 'cultivator,' and that to several improvements until we have the "snikey cultivator," which furnishes a comfortable seat for the driver and the work is better done. The next innovation must be a plow with similar accommodations to be guided and managed with a Farming is becoming a great science, and

more and more every year men are being educated up to it. WORKING AND WASHING BUTTER.-Much has been said says the Country Gentleman, about working butter, but a trial of both ways has led us to believe that in warm weather, better butter can be made by washing than without. On this question Andrew Havens, an experienced butter maker, gives his opinion in a recent Ohio Cultivator, which we condense for our readers, as follows: Some say they would rathor leave the milk in butter than wash it -that washing makes it rancin: but it is a mistake. Milk left in butter will surely sour and the butter becomes strong, besides it is as easy to work out the water as the milk, and if not all worked out, combines with the salt to make a brine which will help to keep the butter sweet. In cool weather we can work out the milk very well without water, but in hot weather we cannot get the milk out very well without water, but in hot weather we cannot without with without without without without without without without withou washing, and hardly with. A great deal of butter is spoiled by the way it is worked. Some work it too much-this makes it greasy like lard, and after standing awhile it turns white and looses its flavor. When working butter never draw the ladle over it, for that will make it greasy, but cut and press with the ladle to work out the milk. Made right, butter always stands up, and will cut smoothe and clean, and not daub the knife, but poor butter will stick to the knife and throat. Butter should never be packed down until it is solid, if put down

How to Judge Cattle. - In all domestic animals the skin or hide forms one of the best means by which to estimate their fattening properties. In the handle of oxen, if the hide be soft and silky, it affords a proof of tendency to take meat. A heast having a perfect touch will have a thick, loose skin, floating, as it were, on a layer of soft fat, yielding to the slightest pressure and springing back towards the finger like a piece of soft leather. Such a skin will usually be covered with an abundance of soft, glossy hair, feeling like a bed of moss, and hence it is termed a mossy skin. But a thick set, hard, short hair always handles hard, and indicates a hard

Thinning in the orehard and nursery is so much neglected, and yet so important that we must, at the risk of repetition, often insist upon it. If one has any doubts upon the subject, let him take to trees of the same variety of peach or pear, and from one remove half or three fourths of the crop, and upon the other ,let all the fruit grow. When the fruit is ripe, market the crop of each tree, keeping a correct account of all the expenses and see which tree has paid the most. One bushel of good fruit will bring more than three bushels of poor.
