AGRICULTURAL.

DON'T EAT RAW HAM, -The lesson to be drawn from the recent cases of trichinosis Springfield is summed up in just these four words. While authorities differ in many other things with regard to this new disease, all agree that if ham and pork are thoroughly cooked there is no danger in eating either. Sometimes the disease has been communicated by cating imperfectly cured "dried beef," but here, too, all danger disappears when the beef is well cooked. These and other facts of special interest to the medical profession are admirably set forth in a communication to the New York Medical Record by Dr. Rustine, of Marion Ind. who has treated several cases of the disease. Dr. Rustine sums up the case as follows:

- 1. That symptoms indicating the presence of young trichinæ in the tissues are observed as early or earlier than the fourth day after the ingestion of the trichinous meat.
- 2. That cysts are formed as early as the twenty-fifth day.
- 3. That, other things being equal, the severity of the symptoms is in direct proportion to the amount of trichinous meat
- 4. That an active cathartic given while the worms are still within the intestinal canol is effectual to a certain degree in causing their expulsion and mitigating the severity of the disease.
- 5. That youth affords no, immunity destroys the the effects of the disease.
- 6. That salting and smoking do not destroy the vitality of the parasite.
- 7. That thorough cooking accomplishes the object.

ONIONS AND EPIDEMICS. - In the spring of 1849 I was in charge of one hundred men on shipboard, with the cholera among the men. We had onions, which a number of the men ate freely. Those who did so were soon attacked, and nearly all died. As soon as I made this discovery their use was forbidden. After mature deliberation I came to the conclusion that onions should never be eaten during the prevalence of epidemics, for the reason that they absorb the virus and communicate disease, and that the proper use for them is sliced, and placed in the sick room, and replaced with fresh onions every few hours. It is a well established fact that onions will extract the poison of snakes; this I personally know. Some kinds of mud will do the same. After maintaining the foregoing opinion for eighteen years, I found the following well attested: Onions placed in a room where there is small pox will blister and decompose with great rapidity; not only so, but will prevent the spread of the disease. I think as a disinfectant they have no equal, when properly used; but keep them out of the stomach. If need be, the foregoing (which I have greatly abbreviated) can be attested

THE BEST GRASS FOR BUTTER.—If you aim at a great flow of milk, feed young timothy and white clover, if you aim at the best results, both in quantity and qual ity of butter, feed on fresh pastures of white clover and timothy in summer, and early cut timothy and wheat bran in winter. The grass must be cut when heading out; or better, young aftermath well cured. Avoid roots and garden stuff in general, if you wish a good quality of butter-though it is held that those fed while milking, or immediately before, will remedy the evil .-Valley Farmer.

How to KEEP MEAT FRESH .- As farmers are at a distance from meat markets. the following directions for keeping meat may be of use to them that try it: Cut the meat in slices ready to fry. Pack it in a jar in layers, sprinkling it with salt and pepper just enough to make it palatable .-Place on the top a thick paper cover, with salt half an inch thick. Keep this on all the while. Meat has been kept three weeks by this process.

GOOSE MANURE. - There is a great prejudice against this excellent fertilizer. It needs only to be well composted to be exceedingly valuable. Geese eat grass, and drink a great deal of water, but the moisture passes off chiefly through the skin and lungs, and their dung is dry and strong; hence it needs composting.

August is the best month in the year for the destruction of briars and thistles. If thistles are cut off when in bloom, about one inch above the surface of the ground. the hollow part of the stem will receive water, and the roots will decay.

THE London Field says that washing a horse when in a sweating state is greatful and beneficial to the animal. When washed, wipe dry and blacket him.

HARNESS is stronger and more comfortable, and last better, when kept soft and pliable with neat's foot oil.

Line and soot mixed and sown on turnips will drive off the turnip fly.
