Storing Potatoes in Winter.

It is often a matter of very great pecuniary importance for a farmer to be able to keep his potato crop until spring. Many made very handsome sums by pursuing this course, the past season. Potatoes were bought last fall for fifty cents a bushel, and those in good order were sold very generally in the spring for two dollars. As long as the custom of early marketing prevails so generally, the man who cultivates the new seedlings and stores them until spring, will be likely to pursue a safe course. Prices are generally higher than for the extra handling, and leaves a margin for profit. They can be stored upon the surface of the ground in any dry position in the same manner as turnips, but this requires much care in covering the pits to account of extreme weather that prevails in the best potato districts. It is not uncommon for the earth to freeze two feet deep, and the raising of a mound with walls of that thickness over potatoes is a great labor. It has its advantages, however, in saving earthing and once handling. The heaps or pits are usually made upon the field where the potatoes grow, and so near together that when the potatoes are picked up they are taken directly to the heaps, which contain from 30 to 100 bushels each, as suits the convenience of the farmer. A light covering of straw is put upon the straw, making a roof that will shed water and keep out the frost. When the farmer wishes to keep his potatoes for the spring market, this is a good method. Another way is to store their potatoes in pits, partly below the surface, but this can only be done where the soil is perfectly drained. There is not much difficulty in the labor involved, or in the security of the crop against frost. Farmers living near ports, who wish to ship their potatoes in winter, build cheap vaults or cellars in hill sides, that will hold from 500 to 1500 bushels. The vault has a window and shoot arranged for tipping in a cart-load at a time, and a door is upon the south end for taking the potatoes out. In cellar storage straw should be thrown over them to keep out the light. This crop keeps best, away from the air, in darkness, and at a low temperature, a few degrees above freezing. That method is best which secures these conditions most perfectly, with the least labor and the least expense.

For heavy work always feed corn to horses. Where you wish them to be sprightly and lively, feed them oats. It is not always safe to allow all horses to "feel their oats" too much. The late Sir Robert Peel, one of the most eminent of English statesmen, lost his life by riding a fractions horse, which his groom had neglected to fill up with water before his master rode him, as he had been ordered. Sir Robert was consequently thrown off and killed. A horse that has a couple of buckets of water in him just before being driven or rode out is not so wild and frisky as one that is empty. That much water is heavy, and keeps him quiet, and compels his good behavior.

STEAMING FOOD FOR CATTLE.—Nothing but steam is wanted to cook hay or any other kind of food. Steam under pressure will cook more rapidly. The difficulty may be in not having your box or steaming vat tight enough. There is no particular danger of steaming hay too much. The softer it is made the easier it is digested.

DESIGNS.—Epsom salts (sulphate of magnesia) dissolved in beer, together with a small quantity of dextrine (artificial gum), and in this state applied to a plate of glass with a sponge or brush, will, on crystallizing, produce identical designs to those produced by frost, and a famous German chemist has discovered a means to transfer these fairy-like creations to stuffs and paper.

Domestic Receipts.

QUEEN PUDDING.—One pint of bread crumbs, one quart of sweet milk, one cup of sugar, yolks of four eggs well beaten. Butter the size of an egg, grate the rind of one lemon and add to the above ingredients; squeeze out the juice of the lemon and add the whites of the eggs beaten to a froth and one teaspoon of white sugar, to be spread on the top of the pudding after it has been baked until done but not watery, set it in the oven for a few minutes, serve with butter. If needed for a dinner party it improves the appearance by spreading on the top of the pudding when taken from the oven a layer of preserves or jelly, and then the sugar and whites of the eggs over the jelly; set it back in the oven and bake slightly, to be served when cold; cut in slices it is very beautiful.

CREAM PIE.—Three eggs well beaten, one teacup of sugar and sweet cream to fill two drop pie plates, bake until done without much whey. Line the pie plate with a crust made with one-third lard and two-thirds water; let particular and see that the crust is well put on. This kind of pie is delicious; flavor with nutmeg.

A MINUTE PUDDING.—Place over the fire one teacup of sweet milk for every quart, let it come to a boil, and stir in one egg, one table-spoonful of flour wet with a little milk, stir it well, let it cook a few minutes, oil common tea-cups with butter and take the pudding into them, when cool turn the cup into a saucer, the pudding will slip out nicely; serve with sweetened cream. This is a quick and cheap dessert.

APPLE MERINGUE.—Preparo six large tart apples for sauce. While hot, put in a piece of butter the size of an egg. When cold, add a cup of fine cracker crumbs, the yolks of three eggs well beaten, a cup of sweet milk or cream, a little salt, nutmeg, and sugar to taste. Bake in a large plate, with an under-crust of rich paste and a rim of puff paste. When done, take the whites of the eggs, half a large teacup of white sugar, and a few drops of essence of lemon; beat to a stiff froth, pour over, and put back in the oven to brown lightly.
