FRANCIS SMITH, of Troy, this county and for the last fifteen years a prominent member of the Bradford County Bar, died at his residence on Saturday last—Bradford Argus.

Morris C. Esen lost a fine gray horse on Friday night last. He had driven him from Hazleton during the day, and on his return the horse seemed to be in perfect health.

The first regular snow of the season in this section, fell on Sunday last, and the job being renewed on Monday, sufficient snow fell to make excellent sleighing. The good qualities are being almost hourly tested.

Several arrests have been made during the past week in Greenwood and Orange townships for chicken stealing. The thieves are in jail awaiting trial. Our Sheriff has his hands full watching prisoners in a very insecure building.

ROBBERY.—We see by our exchange, that robberies are being committed almost nightly in their several localities. So far we have been free from such depredations in this place; but, nevertheless, all persons should use the utmost precaution against thinking of every kind, lest they should be the victims of their own negligence.

The argument for and against a new trial in the Quick case, in which the large sum of \$500,000 is involved, took place on Thursday last in this place, before Judge Elwell. There was a large attendance of lawyers and others in Court. John Handley, Esq., appeared for the plaintiff, and Alfred Hand, Esq., for the Company, both of Scranton. The Judge reserved his decision for a future meeting.

The following gentlemen were excused from attending Court this week as Jurors: Charles Mason and Alex. Colley on account of hard bearing; James Gocher on the ground of having sore foot; Stephen Knorr and William H. Sienacker by reason of their business being of such a character as to make it almost impossible for them to attend. Caleb Barton's name was also stricken from the list, he being unavoidably absent.

The supposed murderers of A. W. Rea arrived at this place on Tuesday evening last and were lodged in jail to await their trial. There are three of them. They were arrested in Schuylkill county, where they lived, but the bloody deed was committed in Columbia county. It was hardly to be expected that they will receive their trial before the next term, in February. The trial will be an interesting and exciting one.

J. J. Robbins & Eyer have purchased of B. Stohrer the "Unlabeled corner lot" on Main street, for \$3,500, and are erecting upon it a store building during the winter. This lot is situated on corner of an alley running from Main to 2nd street, and at the present time is being excavated with a view of some day having a view of the city from the town. Parties interested in this store moved better increase their steps before the present owners of the lot make too great a profit towards completing their plans. They could be widened into a street of comparative little expense while this is in the present condition, and to it seems clear that it should be.

COURT.—The December term of Court commenced in this place on Monday last. There was a large turn-out on the first day considering the inclemency of the weather. Hon. William Elwell, President, and Iron Dorr and Peter K. Horlein, Associates, on the bench. The Jurymen were all in attendance with one or two exceptions. The Grand Jury being called and sworn, William Lamou, Esq., was appointed foreman. After the charge by his honor, Judge Elwell, quite a large number of indictments were placed in their hands. Among the first acted upon was the indictment of the Com. vs. Nathaniel L. Campbell for forgery. A true bill was found. The case was taken up on Tuesday morning, and after hearing and examining some half dozen witnesses, on motion of one of the counsel for the Com., on Wednesday morning, a *nolle prosequi* was entered.

The next case taken up was the Com. vs. The Road Supervisors of Sugarloaf Township for neglect of duty. As we go to press this trial is still going on.

TO KEEP THE FEET DRY.—We notice in our exchange numerous recipes for making shoe leather water proof, most of them compounds involving considerable trouble in preparation and more or less expense, and none of them half so good as the simple article of castor oil, which can be bought at the drug store for 25 to 50 cents a pint, according to your locality. Apply it to the boot when dry, and soak it by the fire till the leather is saturated. Treat the soles in the same way, being careful to dry in well so that they will not grease the carpets. We once treated a pair of calf boots in this way, and a few days after we walked five miles in saturated snow and water from six to ten inches deep at every step, and came out with feet perfectly dry. Castor oil will keep the leather soft, pliable and black, though not glossy, and perfectly impervious to water.

The Berwick Gazette of last week says: On Saturday morning last, as the Hazleton stage was going down the south side of the Nesquehanna mountain, the iron rod that connects the tongue with the axle broke, and in order to prevent the horses from running away, the driver guided them against the side of the road, upsetting the stage. Mr. Mahlon Hicks, of Centre township, this county, who was a passenger, on his way to Mauch Chunk, to visit a sister lying at the point of death, was thrown out and had his leg broken near the hip joint. He was immediately brought back, and is now lying at the residence of his son, Benj. Hicks, of this place. Dr. Little was called upon to dress the broken limb, and the patient is doing remarkably well from all accounts.

RECORD YOUR DEEDS.—We have no doubt that many persons in this county are holding unrecorded deeds which it would be well for them to have recorded, as directed by the provisions of an act of Assembly which requires that "all deeds and conveyances for real estate in the Commonwealth shall be recorded in the office for recording of deeds in the county where the lands lie, within six months after the execution of such deeds and conveyances, and every such deed and conveyance not so recorded as aforesaid shall be judged fraudulent and void against any subsequent purchaser for a valuable consideration, unless such deeds be recorded before the recording of the deed or conveyance under which such subsequent purchaser or mortgagee shall claim." This is a very important notice, and those holding unrecorded deeds will see the importance of having them recorded without further delay.

LAW OF THE ROAD.—Persons meeting in carriages on a highway are to turn to the right of the centre of the highway. It is not the centre of the smooth or most traveled part of the road, but the center of the smooth or traveled part be on one side. In winter, however, when the road is obstructed by snow, the center is the middle of the beaten path. The rule requiring carriages to turn to the right, does not apply to the meeting of a carriage with a horse-car, nor with a traveler on horseback. A traveler on a highway is bound to have his harness and carriage in a road-worthy condition, and is liable for any damage to others occasioned by his insufficiency in this particular.

MISSING.—On last Saturday night a week the 21st ult., Thomas Mahaley, an Irishman by birth, late in the employ of the Penna. Iron Company, left his home in this place, since which time his family has not heard from or received any account of his whereabouts. The last known of him he was seen in the neighborhood of the Grove church, on Bloom street. Of intemperate habits, it is supposed that he may have wandered into the canal and drowned.
