FERRY BOAT HIGH AND DRY

Our citizens just now are very anxiously watching the progress of work on the sidewalk that the river bridge with the lingering hope that some arrangement may be effected between the County Commissioners and the contractors whereby the bridge may be permitted to be crossed before the structure is completed and throwing up an obstruction for traffic. Nearly all the large iron brackets are in position and it would seem that the upper side of the bridge might be made ready for foot passengers in the course of a couple of weeks.

During an interview with Commissioners' Clerk Horace C. Blue yesterday it was learned that the Board has already given the matter some thought and that if it proves at all practicable the bridge will be given permission to be crossed before the bridge is wholly completed.

Engineer Leonard, who has the construction in charge, when in town the other day was consulted on the matter. He was favorably inclined toward the proposition, but thought that the contractors might ask to be released from all liability for injury sustained by persons crossing while the work is in progress. At the same time he was not prepared to say whether with construction at its present stage a person on the sidewalk would be exposed to much or any danger. He felt sure, however, that the contractors, who are responsible for casualties, would not want to assume any risks in the premises.

The matter up to the present has been barely more than talked of. At the same time, if some arrangement can be made whereby persons crossing do so at their own risk it does not seem out of the question that the bridge may be thrown open to pedestrians in the very near future.

Funeral of Mrs. Sanders.

The funeral of Mrs. Sarah Sanders took place Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the family residence Front street. The Rev.
