THE BACKBONE. THE BACKBONE. Ilistory Linked With a Theory of Animal Evolution. The history of the backbone, like that of most life, is not altogether a major-tic upward evolution. It has its trage-dies and its setbacks, its hopes and fail-tures. In the waters along our seashore are creatures, some sponge or lichen-like, others with strange builbille builes, growing on the end of long stalks. But they hold a secret from the erabs and saulis which erawl about, and when the fishes brush against them —If their poor, dull sense only knew it—they might claim a blood brother-hood. The method is based on the fact that fish require oxygen, which their gills take from the water, just as the human lungs take it from the air. Discovering that many kinds of fish would live long out of water if their gil's were kept wet, the German ex-perimenters developed a plan of put-ting the live fish into a hermetically sealed shipping box containing a small amount of water, or water-soaked cloths, from which moisture kept the air saturated, thus prevent-ing the evaporation of the moisture from the gills. dorsed by the voters in Friday even-ing's primaries were formally placed in nomination. 


