—A correspondent of the Boston Journal, who resided for several years in Richthond, gives the following sketch of the topographical features of the country in which Gen.

"If Gen. Butter meets with no serious check he will, capture or destroy Richmond. City Point is the weak spot of Richmond. Petersburg is twenty-two miles from Richmond, on the railroad that runs through Weldon, Ralcigh, Columbia and Charleston to Savannah, which is the great artery of supply and communication of the Confederacy.

"Taking Petersburg, Gen. Butler will cut Lee's main reliance to continue battle, and can move over pretty good ground directly to Manchester, opposite Richmond, and the place would then be at his mercy.
