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WASHINGTON, July 31.—Evening. No news later than 8 o'clock yesterday morning has been received from Petersburg. Word came here that the wildest reports and rumors prevailed in the North and West to-day.

BALTIMORE, July 31.—We have the glorious news from Grant's army, by the Old Point boat, that the siege of Petersburg has had an auspicious commencement. The news received this morning is as follows:

BALTIMORE, July 31.—All doubt as to the good news from Grant's army seems to be removed. A later dispatch, just received, says the assault commenced at four o'clock on Saturday morning by a terrible explosion, which completely destroyed one of the enemy's principal forts...

The great event of long anticipated, namely the explosion of the mine under the rebel fort in front of the 9th Army Corps, came off this morning at 40 minutes past 4 o'clock.

As soon as the explosion took place 120 guns immediately opened on our front, while the musketry played in a continued fire along the front of the 9th and part of the 12th Corps.
