Colored Troops Entitled to Bounty.

It has been decided by the war department that persons of color, who have been enlisted and musterd into the service of the United States, and are musterd on rolls as free on or before April 19th, 1861, are entitled the person as follow viz. if onlisted to bounty, as follows, viz: if enlisted prior to October 24th, 1863, one hundred dollars; if enlisted in an old or-ganization after October 24th, 1893, and prior to April 1st, 1864, three hundred dollars; if enlisted between April 1st, 1864, and July 17th, 1864, inclusive, one hundred dollars. Persons of colo enlisted and musterd into the service, under the President's call for three hundred thousand volunteers October 17, 1863, who were at the time of enlistment enrolled and subject to draft in the state where enlisted are entitled to bounty as follows --- viz : entitled to rounty as 101008--112: Enlisted in any organization, between October 17th and October 24th, 1863 one hundred dollars, enlisted in an ol organization after October 24th '63, and prior to April 1st, '64, three hundred dollars. All enlistments of colored men, after July 18th 1864,

hundred dollars respectively.

Colored soldiers who have been or hereafter shalbe discharged by reason of wounds received in battle, or skirmish on picket, or in action or in the line of duty, and who are other-wise entitled, under existing laws to bounty, are entitled to receive the same bounty as if they had erved out their full term of enlistment.

PERSONS OF COLOR DRAFTED Under the act of March 3d, 1863, and prior to September 5th, 1864, and their substitutes are entitled to a bounty of one hundred dollars provided they serve two full years, They have also the same pay and allowances as white s ldiers.

THEATRE AND CARD PLAYING .- The New School General Assembly has adopted a report in relation to attending theatres and card playing, both of which practices are becoming com-mon among church members The com-mittee do not see any improvement in the theatres since 1818, pronouncing them corrupting and injurious, and improper for Christians and dan-gerous to all, and accordingly reaffirm the resolutions of the Grand Assemb v of that year on the subject. In relation to card playing, they urge a careful watchfulness in avoiding all amusements and recreations calculated to impair spirituality, &c.
