HINTE ON HARVESTING BUCKWHEAT. -The excellence of buckwheat flour depends chiefly on the management of the grain between the ripening and of the grain between the ripening and grinding. The common way of treat-ing buckwheat effectually prevents making good flour, it being allowed to remain in the swarth for several weeks, when it should never be suffered to lie longer than a day or two, and it is decidedly better for the grain to rake it and set it on end, as fast as it is cradled. Much less grain will be wasted by shelling out; the straw will cure and dry out sooner, and make better fodder; the crob will be ready for threshing or housing in less time; for threshing or housing in less time; and the grain will yield a much better quality of flour. It is especially injurious to the grain to be exposed to storms before it is set up, for dirt is spattered all over the grain, by the falling of large rain drops. 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
