GOVERNMENT INCOME-The income of the Government from internal revenue, thus far in the current fiscal year, commencing in the middle of last year, has been somewhat which, if kept up at the same rate, will make the aggregate of the year' receipts from internal taxation alone. three hundred and twenty five millions, and that would be one hundred and thirteen millions more than the internal revenue in the previous fis-cal year, and nearly three times as much as that of the year which en-ded with June 30, 1864. The most reliable estimates of the customs-re venue through all parts of the country place the aggregate at one huu-dred and eighty millions in gold for the whole of the current fiscal year. This would make the total income of the National Treasury from internal revenue, and from duties on imports for the year ending next June, about five hundred and seventy millions of do lars in currency, which is over two hundred millions more than the estimated disbursements of the Government, and this excess over interest and expenses could be applied to the reduction of the public indebtedness.
