THE FOREIGN NEWS. ANOTHER BATTLE. Another arrival from Europe brings news of another battle and another allied triumph. The Europa left Liverpool on the 4th and her intelligence is consequently three days later. The affair of Palestro was a serious engagement. On the 30th ult. the Sarlinian troops commanded by the King in person, crossed the Sesia in the face of the Austrians and took Palestro by storm. At 6 P. M. on the 31st, the Austrians with 25,000 men endeavored to retake Palestro. The Sarlinians made a successful resistance, and finally assumed the offensive, driving the Austrians across the Ticino. The allied headquarters are now at Verocelli, recently occupied by the Austrians. The entrance of the allies into Verocelli was an occasion of great rejoicing. In the night of the 31st the allies captured 1,000 prisoners and 8 guns. 500 Austrians were drowned in a canal during the contest. On the 31st the Austrians made an unsuccessful attack on the Sarlinian vanguard at Sesto Calende, a town at the foot of Lago Maggiore. From this it is evident that the Austrians are marching to the main body of the allies. Garibaldi is making a brilliant incursion into Como. He has been driven from Verese by the Austrians, but returned, re-taken Varese and re-entered Como, where he had his headquarters at last accounts. Como has declared for Sardinia and Garibaldi is recruiting largely from the insurgent population. His force increases constantly. In the Valleina the people have declared for Sardinia and are joining to the revolutionary headquarters at Sondrio. The sun of the news is that the Austrians are beaten in every direction, have abandoned the line of the Sesia, and will make their next stand upon the Ticino in the defence of Lombardy. Discouraged by repeated failures, they will retreat back upon Milan and other fortified places, and to them the seat of war will be transferred. According to the Paris letter of the Commercial General News, with 30,000 men, is in close proximity of Garibaldi, with the double object of protecting him and marching to Milan. Five Austrians had been in prison at Rome, had been released at the demand of the American Commodore and were on board the Washab.

MARKETS. BUFFALO, June 17, 1859. There is a pretty active demand for Flour, and some holders evince a disposition to meet buyers at lower rates. Sales 2,700 bbls, at \$5 75 for extra State from Chicago 'stump-tail' wheat; \$6 00 from No. 1 spring do; \$6 25 for superfine Michigan; \$6 75 for good extra Michigan; \$7 25 for 60 for good to choice extra Michigan; and \$8 00 for favorite do. Wheat dull and held over views of millers. Sales 1,000 bush white Kentucky at 170c; 2,000 bush Standard Club spring at 116c; 300 bush Millwaukee club at 125c; 400 bush white Indiana at 102c; and 500 bush Ohio bagged at 101c. Corn market dull and lower. Sales 5,200 bush New York at 70c; 6,000 bush No. 1 Fall market at 72c; 2,500 bush prime River at 70c; 1,200 bush damaged Toledo at 71c; and 1,000 bush choice Illinois River at 70c. Oats dull; holders are asking 60c for Western, with buyers at 47c-48c. Rye scarce and would sell at 106c. Barley dull and nominal at 60c-65c. FLOUR.—The market heavy and 10c lower. Sales of 6,000 bbls, at \$6 10 for superfine State; \$6 00 for extra State; \$6 20 for 40 for superfine Western; \$6 65 for 00 for common to good extra Western; and \$7 00 for 25 for common to good extra round do. Market closing dull. Canadian Flour continues nominal and dull. Rye Flour dull at \$4 00 for 00, with small sales. GRAIN.—The market for Wheat is heavy and drooping. Sales small parcels white Kentucky at 170c-102c. Rye dull. Sales 300 bush Jersey at 94c; choice held at 97c, with buyers at 96c. Barley more inquired for, and no sales made yet. Corn market is heavy and lower. Sales 17,000 bush; at \$4 for old mixed Western in store; \$3 75 for new inferior do; \$4 00 for prime white Southern for export; \$3 80 for 80 for Southern yellow, the latter an outside price; and \$3 00 for round yellow. Oats are lower and dull, with sales at 47c-61c for State; and 40c-60c for Canadian. The Erie market for Corn, &c., is governed very generally by the prices in Buffalo and New York—hence the reader can readily arrive at prices here from the reports above.
