The addition of time unslaked, as per the following receipt, taken from the Patent office report on Agriculture for 1854. produces the desired result, and its application to fruit and vines has been successfully tried in this vicinity

By publishing it, you will undoubtedly confer a favor on many who regard the "mildew" as comvalent to the total loss of the fruit -as wine made from moldewed grapes are considored by some as unwholesome

"Take one peck of lime, not slaked, and one pound of sulphur, put them together in a bar rel and pour hot water over them sufficient to slake the lime - see that the sulphur is well mixed with the lime, pour on this three gill lone of soft water and stir the mixture well to gether. In 24 hours, it will have settled and become perfectly clear. This should be drawn off as clear as possible. Halt a pint of this mixture added to three gallons of water will be sufficiently strong, and may be applied over the fruit and every part of the vine when the noldew first appears. It can be repeated every tew days, it occasion requires. The first ap plication will kill the most of it , a second and third is all ever found necessary."

NEW YORK, July 30, 1860. DEAR ITEMS :-- I promised to write after my arrival here, and this is the first chance which has come to me. I arrived after a nice sleep in the night-car of what the Irishman calls "The York Canary" Rail Road, and, peripaouncing up Broadway, soon reached my destination. Broadway continues in its chronic state of omnibusteries. The first things, the biggest things, the unavoidablest things, the clumaiest, rumbliest things you meet, to the aumher of about two thousand, in Broadway are omnibusses. They monopolize space, time, patience; They produce "curses" both "loud" and "deep;" They produce roarings and bellowings, they run against each other; they run against everything else. You run against them, and they return the compliment. Broad way has ceased to be broad in any sense-it has become narrow. It is bounded on the North by omnibusses; on the South by omnibusses, on the East and on the West by omnibusses Instead of being broadway, the street is an association or system of intricate labyrinthine narrow ways, with moving omnibusses for their sides. A countryman on his first arrival in Broadway must put a fine edge on all his organs of external sense. His eyes must be kept skinned tight, his ears must be fine ears, like the fairies, he must see and hear, as old Joe used to keep kicking up, both thehind and before 'The New Yorkers have before them a perfect solution of this difficulty -street rails namely -but unaccountably they don't embrace the chance. You can thread the mazes of the Bowery, and other crowded streets, in nice roomy cars; but in Broadway, the most crowded of streets, there is no transportation of persons save per omnibusses. We most doubt whether a New Yorker is a reasoning animal, deducing conclusions from antecedents, or why is this omnibus nuisance kept up ! There is in Broadway room for a double track of railway, somewhat narrower in guage than the other street rulways, yet not by any means too narrow for entire comfort; but the tiothamites don't seem to see it, and omnibusses continue to rige and madden through the streets. 
