NEW JERSEY REQUISITION TO MEDIATE.

A meeting was held in New York, Wednesday evening last, at which a speech was made by James Brooks, of the Express, who introduced the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That the State of New Jersey, in its late demand for the extradition of the fugitive slave, has been respectfully requested to interpose in order to arrest civil war.

By inviting the non-slaveholding States and the loyal slaveholding States—Delaware, Maryland, Kentucky and Missouri—to meet in convention in Louisville, Kentucky, on the 1st day of February next.

By requesting the permission of the President of the United States to send commissioners to Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas and Tennessee, to inform them also to hold in like a national convention.

And—But further resolved, That the President be requested by the State Government of New Jersey to declare an armistice with all such State or States as accept this call for a National Convention.
