

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, HARRISSUNG, Peb. 12, 1868.

In that transaction it appears that these thirteen vessels cost their owners-middle men. ne usual-\$65,283, and that they were chartered to the government at the rate of \$845.655 per annum-an annual profit of three hundred and ticenty-five per cent. Among these was a rotten old hulk called the Patapaco, which was purchased by one of these middle men for \$1,200, and then hired to the government for \$85 per day, and the barge Delawere, which cost \$2,500, hired for \$70 a day. The recovery expenses of this latter vessel were about six or seven dollars a day, and all the rest were the profits of the culprits, whoever they are. These vessels were hired by a man named Hall, who had a monopoly of the busimess, under the direction of Col.
