- The news from the Southwest, i rue, is somewhat discouraging. A Cincionatti tolegram announces the failure of the Steel's Bayon-expedition, which had returned to Young's Point, where the troops were being disembarked. The work on the cat-off opposite Vicksburg had been abandoned.

'No More Negro Regiments. - No more negro regiments are to be raised by vollunteering. Colored patriotism has been found to be at a woful discount, and will be hereafter drafted under the conscription act.

A New MEASURE .- It is understood that every person hereafter artested for exuses to take the oath of allegiance, is to be sent within the enemy's lines. In the West it is said Gen. Burnside has orders to rigidly enforce this rule.

-A Harrisburg paper says the Legislative Investigating Committee appointed to ex-amine the bribery and corruption alleged in connection with the last Senatorial election, will soon be ready to report.

- A Nashville telegram reports a dashing cavalry affair that took place on Tuesday at Green Hill, in which Gen. Mitchell charged upon a rebel camp, capturing fifteen men, killed five, and secured all the arms, thorses, and equipments, Sc. Gen. Mitchell's command marched, fifty-fi, e miles in twelve hours.

AN ABSURD REPORT DENIED .- The Washington Republican says it has the best au-thority for stating, that the report that Gen. Hooker replied to a question propounded by the committee on the conduct of the war to the effect, viz: that he attributed the failure of the peninsula campaign to the incompetency of the commanding General, M'Clellan, 15 WHOLLY FALSE. Gen. Hooker did not give any such testimony.

- A long fetter from Parson Brown-low, dated Nashville, March 6th, among other things, says :- I told the people of the North, in my speeches, as thousands of them will recollect, what I now repeatthat is to say, one half of all the slaves in the seconded States will fight for their owners, and fight to perpetuate their own bondage.
