An Extensive Establishment.—It may not be known to meet of our readers, that the stove esta dishment of Mensea Vincent, Tibbals, Shirk & Co., in this city, is one of the most extensive of the sort West of the Hudson-River. Through the courtesy of one of the proprietors, we were, on Monday, given an epportunity to fully examine the works, and ascertain the amount of business they were capable of perferining, and we doubt not the result of our visit will be as interesting to our patrons as it was to ourself.

It will be remembered that the establishnent was almost totally destroyed by fire on the night of the Slat of October last, the only portion saved being that which is now used as moulding room. Arrangements were at once made to rebuild, and so active were matters pressed forward, that on the 17th of Pebruary following, a car load of stoves, manufactured in the new concern, was sent to Chicago. At the time of the configration, the firm had very large orders for stoves to fill in the West, and the damage to their business, through inability to supply their enstomers. and the obstructions to their regular course of trade, was actually larger than that directly caused by the destruction of their pro-

The first branch of the cancern which we risited was the melting room, where the iron is prepared for the founders. The average mount used here daily is 9,000 pounds, though it varies somewhat, one day being less and others more. From there we descended to the moulding room, where all the cast ings are made. Here we found a busy scene, some twenty-five or thirty men being employed at preparing the moulds for receiving the iron. Everything seemed to move off like clock work, and we could not help but admire the systematic manner in which the affairs of responsible for one humbug less. the establishment appear to be conducted. The trade of moulding is one of the very best at which a man can be employed. A good workman in this line is almost certain of permanent employment, at fair wages. Some of the moulders in these works make as high as eighteen dollars a week, and they usually Sunday School service. Sunday school at the average about fifteen,

From the moulding room, the castings are taken to the grinding ream where they are carefully cleaned and burnished, and afterwards placed in the hands of the "Atters." Here they are carefully examined, and each imperfect one thrown to one side, to be remoulded. Every workman takes a certain pertion of the stove, fixes it ready for putting together, and it is then placed in the hands of another person, who "sais it up." When this is accomplished, it is hoisted up stairs into the ware room, where it is kept ready for sale. The men in the fitting room average from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a day. There are generally from fifty to sixty persons in the employ of the firm, and they all receive what is usually considered good wages.

The popularity of some kinds of stoves is astonishing. Of one variety shown us, 10,000 it. were sold in the eight years between 1862 and enport, Conrad Doll, A. Fliegol, D. W. h. Richard Gaggin, N. The establishment is now turning out an average of about 27 a day. The works are capable of doing nearly twice as much as this, and would find a ready sale for all the stoves they could make, but the difficulty of getting moulders stands in

The firm have a branch at Chicago, through which by far the larger portion of their stoves are sold. But their wholesale and retail trade at home is also considerable, and would be thought enormous in establishments of a less extensive character. It appears a little Hotel and the Reed House have been styled able to make and ship stoves to the largest city of the West, at a rate sufficiently moderate to compete with their dealers; but such is the fact, and it speaks more than words could express, in favor of the enterprise and skill of the gentlemen who conduct this establishment.
