DEARER CASES. Our readers will remember that we mentioned last week, the case of a sister, who was washed on the dock, during Sunday night, the 21st inst. Her name is Mrs. William Thompson, a Norwegian, employed on the schooner St. Andrew.

On Wednesday, the 23d inst., a sailor, who we name as Peter Carrier, was arrested, and committed to jail, charged with being the man who stabbed Thompson. A knife with blood upon it, and identified as one belonging to Carrier, has been found, with which the stab is supposed to have been done.
