The Fight at Charleston.

The latest news from Charleston is to the 23d, by way of Richmond. The Nentinel, of that city, has dispatches which show that Fort Sumter had been hadly injured by the heavy guns of Gen. Gillmore, and was likely to soon fall. A portion of the walls had been battered down, and some of its guns dismounted. The dispatch on Tuesday evening of the surrender of the Fort is without foundation. The rebels may have to abandon the Fort. but it would be of nouse to us until the batteries which command it are also taken. The last dispatches say that Gen. Gillmore had commenced firing upon the city of Charleston. We feel quite confident that before many weeks the hot-bed of secession will fall into Union hands.

LATEST-Sumter is a mass of ruins, and its guns have been removed to the rebel batteries adjacent. Gen. Gillmore has commenced shelling Charleston with "Greek fire." He has made a demand for the surrender of the city, which has been refused by Beauregard.

A BAND of rebel guerrillas, generally cuown as Quantrell', Band, made a dash into Lawrence, Kansas, last week, and after murdering and wounding about 180 citizens, burned down the city. Among EJ Pullman those killed were the Mayor and his son, and a number of other prominent citizens—all shot down in their own houses in the midst of their families. The loss in property, it is estimated, will amount to about two millions, which will fall heavily on New York as well as Lawrence merchants. The people of Lawrence, it appears, were wholly unprepared for this attack, and they received no assistance from the military in the district until too late to avert the calamity.
