by request, and call attention to the suggestions which it contains: A CARD .- Having entered upon the discharge of my duties as Superintendent of Common Schools of Eric Co., I desire to call the attention of Directors, Teachers and Parents to the State Normal School, located at Edenboro, in this County. It is a State in-stitution—founded, supported and conducted on purpose to train Teachers in all that perchildren of our Schools. We have not yet done much to help to sustain it, nor have we received much benefit from it. The fault is our own. Each Board of Directors in the County has the privilege of sanding one pupil to this School. This privilege the law gives you, in addition to which, the Principal of the School offers free tuitien, as a prize, to the best Teacher in the District. It seems to me these inducements ought to stimulate us to make an effort in this direction. Without better Teachers, we cannot hope to have bet ter Schools. Our Teachers must have more culture and more training. The leading agency to be relied upon to improve the Teacher must be found in our "A School" and in the "District Institule." have not received that attention which their importance demands. It is impossible to es-timate the real value of such agencies. Will our many excellent Directors think upon this subject, and select some worthy person, from each District in the County to receive instruction at the Normal School? By so loing, you will show that? you have a desire to improve your Schools. Let us give to our Normal School all the pupils they can educate.
