Thy present difficulty is, not that the Have not sufficiently oripplet and humbled the South for victory to bear its appropriate fruits, but that this administration is politically incapable of making a just, magnant. mous, and satisfactory pasca.

But why could a Democratic administration deal with this problem more successfully than that of Mr. Lincoln ? The reasons are various. In the first place, the Democratic party has never given any countenance to the twenty years' crusade against Southern institutions kept up by the Abolitionists. The South, in negotiating with a Democratic administration. would have no fears of being entrapped into false position and circumvented by perfidy. They had some experience of the good faith of Mr. Lincoln and Mr. Seward in the apring of 1861, when Judge Campbell, of the Supreme Court, was the intermediary, between the South and the government, with the knowledge and privity of Judge Nelson, of this State. The war would probably have been avoided had it not been for the strong

radical pressure upon Mr. Lincoln. and the faithlessness of his Secretary of State. Even if the administration had adhered to the constitutional policy professed in Mr. Lincoln's inaugural, the South would naturally recoil from an attempt to arrange this controversy with the same officials who deceived them with false professions in the very orisis of these difficulties.

But Mr. Lincoln has made peace impossible unless the South will consent to the destrucion of the most valuable part of their property, and the subversion of their industrial system. Whatever may be the cash value of this property, every dollar, of it is an argument against submission addressed by hr. Lincoln to the self interest of the South. The Southern people know that the Democratic party does not approve of this policy; that they have steadily protosted against it as a fingrant violation of the Gaustiturion. ,If the Democratic party were in power, the question would be simply between further resistance on the one hand, and submission to the same Constitution under which they formerly lived and prospered, on the other. Whatever forfaitures have been operated by the necessary result of the war, would be adjudicated upon by the Courts in obrdience to established preedents, and not determined by the infuriated passion magning politionists. The Source in -ubmitting to the Constitution as the Constitution has always heretofore been understood, could calculate pretty acarly the legal affect of their submission. Then, throw the lapse of time, vaccination appears frequently to lose all its protecting influence ; while the changes wrought in the system at the period of pubbrity tend also to impair if not wholly to destroy its power. Indeed, it now and then happens that even persons who have once suffered from small por, are again attacked in after years. There seems to be no. however, show the great importance of vas-
