EXTRACTS FROM THE NEW NATION.

ITS OPINION OF SECRETARY WELLES. Must the people remain dumb and stupidly scoulesce in all the costly blunders and disgraceful figsous of Secretary Welles, because Mr. Lincoln mulishly refuses to remove that incompetent official? No * * Mr. Lincoln cared more for the indulgence of his individ ual caprice than he did for the wishes of the people or the honor and safety of the nation. He has kept Mr. Welles in his place, and we have continued to resp an abundant harvestof disasters from his well-intentioned incapasity. He is never ready at the right time nor in the right place. Though he has expended nearly a hundred millions of dellars in the construction of iron clads, though he had a fleet of them lying idle near Charleston, and in Norfelk, he laft Plymouth to be defended by three frail wooden guaboats, bne of which had been a canal boat and another a States.

Island ferry-bost. He knew, or he should have known what all the rest of the country knew, that the rebels were constructing two iron rams in the Boanoke river for the express purpose of capturing Plymouth and destroying our frail gunboats stationed there for the defence of the town and the forts, just as he had timely warning of the preparations of the Merrimac at Norfolk to destroy our feet in Hamnton Roads. The hamada no attempt whatever to repel the expected rebel ram; he had from-clads in abundance at his command close by, but he sent none of them where their presence was so vitally necessary. He had thirty five, ships ready for sea, but could not get one of them off, because he had not taken the right measures to secure orews to man them; and while he sat in his little. office in Washington, placedly glowering through his spectacles, and complemently oultivating his long silvery beard, down came the rebel rams upon our devoted gunbosts, crushing them as though they had been made of pie crust, killing their gallant crews, and sending them, with their costly armament, to the bottom. The town and the garrison surrendered to the foe, and the nation was again condemned to useless lamentations over another disheartening disaster, caused by the sheer imbecility of our Navy Department.

There is now lying in the East river the finst frigate in our navy, where she has been lying for more than two months unable to get to ses for the lack of men, or some other cause, and there is one of our old sloops of war sent to chase the piratical Anglo-rebel steamer Florida, which is committing depredations upon our commerce. And Mr. Welles is spending a hundred and twenty millions of dollars a year in the fruitless attempt to make our navy a match for the half-dozen vessels sent against us by Jeff: Davis !

We believe it to be essential , to the safety of the nation, and to the preservation of our liberties, that the President should not be eligible to re-election; but for the fatal omission in our Constitution to restrict the Presithe people could never have been so corrupted | Zeitung. and demoralized as to lead to that condition of affairs which made secession possible. * It would matter nothing to us who were the occupant of the White House at this time. We should strenuously oppose his nomination for another term. Let Mr. Lincoln, and let his Herald, Lake City Pioneer. advocates look at the last five Presidential elections, and learn what will be the result of the next one. If Van Buren, and Polk, and Pierce, to say nothing of Fillmore and Buchanan, or Tyler, failed to secure a renomination, how can it be expected that their sucnemor now in once will succeed? Or, even if he should succeed in gaining a renomination at the Baltimore convention by the wirepulling and pipe laying operations of his paid retainers, what chance can he have of a reelection with such a record of his official acts

This proposition is an insult to the suffering people and a breach of all decency.

Had the surrender of Harper's Perty, the flight at Winchester, or the many cowardly abandonments' that have constantly dishonoured our army from the commencement of the war, been followed by impital bentences and immediate execution of the commanding officer surrendering a postebelonging to the nation, the first example made would certainly not have been succeeded by snother.
