SAYS : "Our entire losges, thus far, in killed, wounded, missing, &c., must reach near 40,000. The enemy's loss in killed is much greater than ours; his wounded about the same. He is supposed to hold some two thousand of our prisoners, and we must have at least five thousand of his men, while our scouts report the roads literally alive with his stragglers. It is a mathematical question requiring only few more days to determine the limit of his ndurance.'

The New York Herald's dispatch, of May 12th, says : "Very important news has just been received. The result of the last great battle (Wednesday) is the defeat of the rebels and the retreat of Lee. Twenty thousand prisoners and twelve cannon have been capinred."

Telegrams of this (Friday) morning an. nounce that Gen. Hancock, on Thursday morning, effected a complete surprise of the enemy, capturing 30 or 40 guns, 2,000 prisoners. and several Major and Brigadier Generals. This news appears to be authentic. The main rebel army, however, still remains in its enrenchments on the Po river.
