It was that they were decide representation. They complained of taxation without repre-sentation. [Choses] One of the great prin-ciples laid down by our fathers, and which find their hearts, was that there should be no tradition with concentration taxation without representation. How then dees the matter stand? Who has been usureing power ? Who has been defeating the oper ration of the Constitution ? and what now remains to be done to complete the restoration of these States to all their former relations under the federal government, and to finish the reat ordeal through which we have been tation, what do we mean ? We mean representation in the constitutional and law abiding sense, as was intended at the beginning of the active as was intended at the beginning of the government. The Constitution declares in express terms that each House, the Senaté and House of Representatives, each acting for itself, shall be the judge of the returns, election and qualifications of its own members. It is for each house to settle that ques-tion under the Constitution and under the solemn sanction of an oath. And can we believe that either Horse would admit any member into its body to participate in its proceed. ings? They have the power, not the two Houses, but each Bouse for itself. The Constitution further declares that no State shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Son-ste of the United States without its consent. Then where do we sixed ? [Cheers.] And when the States do send loyal representatives, can you have any better evidence of their fidelity to the Constitution and the laws? There is no one learned in the Constitution and the laws who will say that if a traitor Happens to get into Congress, that body cannot expel him after he gets in. That makes assurance doubly ure, and conforms the action of the government to the Constitu been contending against traitors, and treason, and iscession, and the dissolution of the Union, I have b, on contending at the same i ime against the consolidation of power here [Cries of "Good !"] I think the consolidation ion of power here is equally dangerous with the separation of the States. [Cheers] The one would shatter us and might run into anarchy, while the other would concentrate and eventnate in monarchy. [Cheers, said pries of "Caa"t do it!"] Oh, but there is an Idea abroad that one man can be a despot, that one man can be a usurper; but that a aundred or two hundred men can not. Mr. Jefferson, the spostle of liberty, tells us, and so does common sense, that tyrainy and des-pottem can be exercised by many more vigorously and more tyrannically than by one. What power has your President to be a tyrant ? What can he do? What can he originate ? What can be do: "What can be originate?" Why, they say he excretises the velo power [[Langhter.] What is the veto power? [[voice----- To put down the ngger." Lang... ter] Who is your President? [Several voices----- Andy Johnson."] Is he not elected by the people through the electoral colleges? The Presideat is nothing more than the tri-bune of the people. His office is tribunal in its character. In olden times, when tribunes were first elected in the Roman Republic, they stood at the door of the Roman Senate. which was then overreaching on the popular rights and putting the heel of power on the necks of the poople. The people chose a Tribuae and placed him at the door of the Senate, so when that body, ventured an op-pressive act he was ready with power to ray, "Veto, I forbid.". Your President now is the Tribane of the people. I thank God I am and I intend to amort the power which th
