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ELECTION NEWS.

THE GOOD FAITH MEN, ADVANCING.

The returns of the election in Chicago, on Tuesday last week, show that the tide is turning in the West as well as in the East.

The Democrats reduced the R-publican majority at the last municipal election in Chicago from 5,939, and increased it to 5,000.

Radical majority for 1865.....5,939

It will be seen by these figures that while there were 271 more votes cast for the Democratic candidates for Aldermen than for their candidate for Mayor, a similar comparison of the Radical votes shows a decrease of 737, making the actual record of the Radical majority of 1865, 2,799 instead of 1,601, as indicated by the vote for Mayor.

Minnesota shows evident signs of an early reversion from the thralldom of Radical rule. St. Anthony elects a Democratic Mayor and the entire city ticket.

In Elkhart, Indiana, the Democrats elected J. F. Stevens by a majority of three votes—a large Democratic gain.

And in Burlington, N. J., has been carried by the Democrats. It went Radical by 130 majority last year.

The Democracy of Quincy, Ill., with Hon. James M. Pittman as their candidate for Mayor, have carried the city by 700 majority. They have gained largely since the last election.

A thousand men are walking the streets of Portland, Connecticut, asking for employment, who were discharged by Radical employers for daring to vote the Democratic ticket at the late election in that State.
