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THE LOWRY MEETING.
The friends of Mr. Lowry held their first
public meeting in the city to advance his in-
terests, in the Court House, on Monday evening.
We are not informed whether they were
required to pay ten dollars, as the Demo-
cratic County Convention was, for the use
of the building, but presume that as the jan-
itor is somewhat liberally disposed towards
them they procured it at a reduced rate.
The community had been told by the Dis-
patch, which did not appear to be aware that
it was being used as a "cat's paw" for Lowry,
that an old-fashioned, grand and tremendous
rally would take place. Everybody was on
the tip-toe of excitement in consequence,
and it was confidently expected that a dem-
onstration would occur that would make the
city a peculiarly brilliant scene. Accord-
ingly all the little and big boys about the
city, who enjoy anything that will contribute
to their joy of variety, were promptly on hand
at the West Park, where a bon-fire was lit
to the occasion. A number of zeal-
ous persons straggled in to collect the
torch, and a little before eight o'clock
enough boys were found willing to make an
exhibition of themselves to get up a respect-
able procession. The line presented a
formidable array of tall boys and short boys,
fat boys and lean boys, whose mothers
knew they were out, and others who didn't.
A carefully compiled table, gathered by some
dozen celebrated mathematicians, specul-
antly employed for the occasion, and care-
fully posted at various points on the route, de-
velops the fact that the procession was com-
posed as follows: Voters, 17; big boys, 65;
little boys, 33; niggers, 1—total 136. This huge
procession, which was calculated to strike
terror into the hearts of wicked Copperheads,
paraded around several squares, and having
accomplished its patriotic mission, suddenly
struck a sea for the Court House, where it
arrived at a little after eight. One of our
artists took a sketch of the white on the march,
which is truly thrilling in its life-like fidelity,
and is expected soon to appear in proper
form.
At the Court House, an audience had gathered,
which, when swelled by the torch-light
crowd, just comfortably filled the hall, which
will hold perhaps five hundred persons. The
meeting was held in the Court House, where
the speaker, Mr. Lowry, was introduced by a
prominent among whom were the irre-
pressible gentleman, in whose interest the
meeting was called, and his faithful aid-
camp, the Chairman of the Radical County
Committee. The "weak-kneed, and bow-
backed, and sunken-eyed" element of the
party was simply represented, those who
were in attendance looking much like moun-
tains at their own funeral. On motion of
George Lowry (Lowry) Mayor Noble (Lowry)
was called upon to preside. The principal
object having been secured, the balance
was distributed around among the Germans
and Colton men, as a salve for the slights and
wounds received by them at the late County
Convention. They will undoubtedly appre-
ciate the favor as its full value.
The first speaker was Hon. B. H. Brewster,
Attorney General of the State, who said that
he had not made a political speech for many
years, and had only come to Erie at the
urgent solicitation of Senator Lowry, between
whom and he there has been a long personal
friendship. He enlightened the audience
with the information that he had been a Dem-
ocrat until the opening of the war, when he
became a red hot Radical. His speech was
a dry, logical and unimpassioned speech,
and was mainly devoted to urging the Radicals
present to accept of negro suffrage as a car-
dinal feature of their creed, which he said
the party would have to do or die. We sim-
ply state the substance of what he said, and
leave it to the readers of the paper to judge
himself most adequate, that the effort of Mr.
Brewster did not equal his reputation, and
that the great object of the meeting, to
place in discussion the question of negro
suffrage, was not accomplished. His allu-
sions to the intimate friendship between him
and Mr. Lowry, and the many of his hear-
ers from the story, and most of them were
glad when he closed.
The next speaker was Geo. W. Groves, a
Grove, better known to the people as
"Brazo Grove," from his identification with
the swindling speculation of Calver. Like
Brewster, he had once been a Democrat, and
like all renegades, his remarks against his
former political allies were infused with more
falseness and meanness than it would be
possible for a consistent member of the Op-
position to utter. The opening of his speech
was in the following words: "I have been
in a somewhat of a quandary as to what to
do in this matter, but I have finally decided
to give you the impression that he had just
left some-down East college. Mr. Groves' whole
object appeared to be to revive the passions
of the past, and to divide the party into
two camps on the strength of the name. The
portion of his speech was completely un-
intelligible to the majority of the audience,
and the remainder of the speech was a
repetition of the same. We do not wonder,
after hearing Mr. Groves, that he has been
dropped from a position of prominence to
that of an ordinary local politician. He is
evidently a man of small caliber, who must
have been fostered into notoriety by accident.
The President stated that Hon. G. W. Groves
was followed by Mr. Groves, but the hour
being late, and gentlemen being weary, he
did not stay to finish his speech, but de-
parted, and we leave the remainder of the
meeting to the discretion of the audience.
The meeting was adjourned at 10 o'clock,
and the audience dispersed in various direc-
tions. The meeting was a success, and the
cause of the party was advanced.
