CELEBRATES SHERMAN DAY. Vice Presidential Candidate Notified at Utica.

Senator Julius C. Burrows Makes the Speech of Notification, and Other Prominent Public Men Deliver Addresses—Elaborate Decorations Everywhere—Band Concerts A-Plenty. Outdoor Programme.



Utica, N. Y., Aug. 18.—"Sherman Day" was ushered in with the booming of cannon. A salute of thirteen guns announced that the ceremony of notifying James S. Sherman of his nomination for the vice presidency by the Republican party had begun.

Next the notification committee escorted by the Conkling Unconditionals, the marching club which attracted considerable attention in Washington at the inauguration of President Roosevelt, proceeded behind a massed band of 110 pieces to the home of Mr. Sherman, on Geneva street.



Arrangements were made for the use of the Majestic theater for the notification ceremonies in the event of rain. The notification exercises occurred shortly after the noon hour.

A platform was erected at the Sherman home, where the decorations were profuse. Hon. Julius C. Burrows of Kentucky, the chairman of the notification committee, addressed Mr. Sherman, and the latter responded to Senator Burrows. Secretary of State Elihu Root, also present, delivered an address, as did Hon. Thomas Wheeler, mayor of Utica, Charles S. Symonds, chairman of the citizens' reception committee, and President M. W. Stryker of Hamilton college.
