RECORDING DEEDS.—Parties coming into the possession of properties this spring, should not lose sight of the provisions of the act of Assembly which requires that all deeds and conveyances for real estate in this Commonwealth, shall be recorded in the office for Recording Deeds, in the county where the lands lie, within six months after the execution of such deeds and conveyances; and every such deed and conveyance not so recorded as aforesaid, shall be adjudged fraudulent and void against any subsequent purchaser for a valuable consideration, unless such deeds be recorded before the recording of the deed or conveyance under which such subsequent purchaser or mortgage shall claim.—E. The skeleton remains of two human bodies, about two feet below the surface of the ground, were dug out yesterday in excavating for the foundation of the new Court House. They lay horizontally east and west, as civilized people are laid in the ground, and about eight feet apart. Who they were, and when they were buried, no one knows. The skull bones were almost entirely decayed. The bones of the bodies were perforated and full of holes, and almost ready to fall to pieces. The remains were found inside of the foundation walls of the old Court House.
