It is this, more than else, that has prevented wrong legislation,-and thus is to be credited with the negative benefits of the session just closed.

The next session of the Legislature will be charged with high important duties. It must, of necessity, complete the work of the recent Legislature, by giving full effect to the new Constitution. We are desirous that candidates shall be able men, capable of grasping the spirit and purpose of our fundamental law, and ready to give it effect by wise, conservative legislation.
