PROCLAMATION.—WHEREAS, the Hon. BENJ. F. JUNKIN, President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas for the 9th Judicial District, composed of the counties of Juniata, Perry and Cumberland, and the Honorable Jonathan Weiser, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas for the 10th Judicial District, composed of the counties of Juniata, Perry and Cumberland, have issued their precept to me directed, bearing date the 24th day of April, 1874, has returned to me, and I have returned to the Court of Common Pleas for the 9th Judicial District, and General Jail Delivery, and General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, at MIFFLINTOWN, on the FIRST MONDAY of SEPTEMBER, 1874, being the 7th day of the month.

By an Act of Assembly, passed the 8th day of May, A. D. 1854, it is made the duty of the Justices of the Peace of the several counties of this Commonwealth, to return to the Clerk of this Court of Quarter Sessions of the respective counties, all the recognitions as entered into before any person or persons charged with the commission of any crime, except such cases as may be ended before a Justice of the Peace, under existing laws, at least ten days before the commencement of the session of the Court to which they are made returnable, and in all cases where they may be made returnable in less than ten days before the commencement of the session to which they are made returnable, the said Justices are to return the same in the manner as if said act had not been passed.

Order Fixing the Terms of Court. THE following order is hereby made: Term to wit, July 6, 1874, it is ordered that the terms of the several courts of the County of Juniata, composed of the counties of Juniata and Perry, be fixed as follows: In the County of JUNIATA, September Term—On the First Monday of September, and continue one week.
