A convention of elders of Huntington Presbytery will meet in the Tyrone Presbyterian Church on Tuesday, December 8, 1874. The following order of business and program of subjects has been agreed upon by the Executive Committee.

SUBJECTS FOR DISCUSSION. First subject—"Should the Elders lead the weekly prayer meetings?"

Second subject—"Should promise meetings and praise meetings be encouraged in the congregations?"

Third subject—"Is it a sufficient excuse for the absence of an Elder from a meeting of the Session, that his secular business required his attention, or that it was inconvenient for him to be present?"

Fourth subject—"Is it not the imperative duty of Church Sessions and parents of Presbyterian families to instruct the children and members of the church in the doctrines of the Shorter Catechism?"

Fifth subject—"What is the best method of teaching the Shorter Catechism?"

Sixth subject—"What is the proper relation of the Elders of the Presbytery to the Y. M. C. A., and other voluntary organizations for religious purposes?"

Seventh subject—"How can a church be made most efficient in working for Christ?"

Eighth subject—"How can Elders who live a great distance from a Sabbath-school best promote the Sabbath-school work?"

Ninth subject—"Are street meetings for religious purposes proper, and should they be encouraged?"
