Laws Belating to Newspaper Subscriptions and Arrearages.

In response to a request, we give the law as it stands relating to newspapers and subthief .- Lewistown Sentinel. scribers :

1. Subscribers who do not give express p tice to the contrary, are considered wish-ing to continue their subscription. 2. If subscribers order the discontinuance

of their periodicals, the publishers may continue to send them until all arread ages are paid.

 If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held respon-sible until they have settled their bills and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible. 5. The Courts have decided that orefusing

to take periodicals from the office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facia evidence of intentional

6. Any person who receives a newspaper, and ninkes use of it, whether he has or-dered it or not, is held in law to be a

subscriber. 7. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher, at until an express notice, with payment of that he had gone out on the platform. sey, MeVeytown. all arrearinges, is sent to the publisher.
