This victory, as the rebels were pleased to term it, caused a great excitement and joy among the Southern people. However hard it had been heretofore to convince the nation that we were on the eve of a civil war, it was inevitable.

Accordingly, at 12 o'clock on the 11th of April Gen. Beauregard made a formal demand for the surrender of the fort. He was determined either to have the fort or batter it down before reinforcements should come.
