It would be well for some parties to read the following sections of an act of Assembly in reference to trespassers, and to govern themselves accordingly: Any person or persons who shall willfully enter or break down, through or over any orchard, garden or yard fence, or over any greenhouse, or who shall willfully cut, break, or damage any nut, fruit or ornamental tree, shrub, bush, plant, or vine, trellis, arbor, hot-bed, hot or greenhouse; or who shall willfully trespass upon, walk over, beat down, trample or in anywise injure any grain, grass, vines, vegetables or other growing crop, shall and may, on conviction thereof before any Alderman, or Justice of the Peace, or in any court of law, have judgment against him, her or them, in a sum not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars, with costs of suit: one-half of the damage or penalty to go to the use of the informer, the other half of the damage or penalty to the occupant or owner of the premises on which the said trespass shall or may be committed; and in default of any payment of said fine or judgment may and shall be committed to the jail of said county, for not less than twenty nor more than sixty days, said complaint or action to be in the name of the Commonwealth, and the testimony of the owner or occupant of the premises shall be admitted as evidence to prove the trespass and damage sustained: Provided, That when the owner of the premises shall become the informant, then one-half of the penalty shall be appropriated to the school fund of the district in which the trespass was committed.
