The sheep skin of Mr. Gallo, in Patterson was robbed last Wednesday night of about \$40.00 worth of goods and shoes.

Samuel Earnest had a hand severely crushed while in the act of coupling cars in the Patterson railroad yard last Thursday.

About 1500 people, citizens of Millin, Perry and Juniata counties, formed the excursion to Gettysburg held last Thursday.

A well dug and used by the Taylortown people has been reopened in the Park. It proves itself a most satisfactory acquisition during the fair.

David Bushart, Sr., bought of the Juniata Valley Farm the farm in Millin township lately known as the Col. Patterson farm. Price paid, \$5,500.
