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RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. To a large number of the citizens of this place to-day has been an occasion of deep interest—it having been designated according to previous arrangement, as the time for the first Re-union of the 49th Regiment, P. V., a Regiment having one of the most glorious records of any first ever marched out from our State during the late civil war.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. At 11 o'clock A. M., those who had arrived on the previous day and early this morning, formed in a line on Main street, and, headed by a fine Band of music, escorted those who then arrived in the train, to the Town Hall, where the process of organization was carried out by the election of Colonel Womack as President, also ten Vice Presidents—one to represent each Company in the Regiment. In addition to this Lieut. Deemer was elected Secretary, with Lieut. Glass as assistant.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. The organization thus completed was declared by unanimous vote to be "The Association of the 49th Regiment, P. V." to the membership of which every honorably discharged member of the Regiment is eligible simply upon his own request for said membership being made to the Secretary, Lieut. Deemer, whose P. O. address is Hollidaysburg, Pa.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. The Association then adjourned until 2 P. M., when they re-assembled at the Town Hall, formed in procession, and, being kindly and courteously escorted by the "Logan Guards"—Co. G—and headed by the Band, marched to the Court House, and occupied sittings reserved for their use. The large hall was filled to its utmost capacity by the Teachers of the county and the friends of the Regiment.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. At the opening of the exercises the President briefly stated to the friends present the object of the Association, also that they proposed to publish an accurate and complete history of the Regiment, as well as to erect a suitable monument in some central location. The meeting was then opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Ross, a former Chaplain of volunteers, and this was followed by an intensely interesting oration by Chaplain Earnshaw, formerly the Chaplain of the Regiment, and now holding that position in the U. S. Military Home at Dayton, Ohio. It would be impossible to depict the thrilling and social effect resulting from this masterly address. It is rarely that so much tenderness and martial spirit can be so happily blended as on this occasion.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. Responding to frequent and hearty calls, Lieut. Ritter, now pastor of the Eleventh Baptist Church of Philadelphia, then came forward and delivered a brief address, for which he was heartily applauded at its conclusion. The exercises being over, the Regiment was then escorted by "Co. G" along the principal streets, and closed with a dress parade.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. In the evening an adjourned and final meeting was held in the Town Hall, opened with prayer by Rev. I. N. Ritter, after which it was decided to hold the next Re-union in Huntingdon, at 11 A. M., on November 7, 1876. After interesting addresses by Col. Womack, Capt. J. L. Barton, Lieut. I. Newton Ritter, Lieut. R. Davidson and others. The meeting then adjourned, and with the tenderness of a brotherly affection seldom surpassed, these comrades in arms bade each other adieu, until Nov. 7, 1876.

RE-UNION OF 49th REGIMENT, P. V. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 28, 1875. There were about seventy members present, one of whom had come about 900 miles, another one about 400, and several more than 100 miles, so strong was the attachment to the old Regiment. JUNIATA.
