Lost Creek Congregation Before the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church has been holding its sessions in the Fermanagh Church, Brookly (Dr. Talnaght).

In accordance with the recommendation of the report, the Moderator appointed the following committee to try the case: Rev. P. H. Fowler, D. D., Rev. S. G. Logan, D. D., Rev. Matthew N. Clark, and Elders D. A. James and E. S. Wills.

McAlister, Esq., for a meeting of citizens past 50 years of age—to organize under recommendation of Congress, and under Proclamation of President Grant and Governor Hartman, to collect statistics of the past history of the respective counties, of elder living citizens, to form History, to be placed on record— took place in the Court House in the borough of Millintown, yesterday, Tuesday, May 30, 1876.

By motion of E. S. Doty, H. T. McAlister was elected President of the meeting. By motion of J. A. Christy, E. S. Doty was elected Secretary of the meeting.

The President stated that the object of the meeting originated with Congress, a high and intellectual source, and was suggested by patriotic considerations in connection with the celebration of the first Century of our National existence.

The following resolution was offered and adopted: Resolved, That a committee of two from each township and borough be appointed by the Chair to collect statistics as to the early settlement of what is now Juniata county, and report to the Historian who may be appointed by the meeting.

The Chair appointed the following committee: Millintown—John Wright, J. A. Christy, Furber, O. L. Hench, Patterson, Esq., Midland, J. Pennington, Port Royal—Dr. W. Beale, G. W. Jacobs, Bruce Hill—J. D. M. Howell, Jacob McLaughlin.

Resolved, That the editors of all the papers in the county are requested to publish the proceedings of this meeting. H. T. McAlister, President.
