Judge Junkin delivered his opinion in the matter of the application of Jacob Gideon Leidy, before reported—deciding that he was liable for the support of his father, and that the Court would fix a sum for maintenance if petitioner so desired.

Robinson vs. Rhine and Rhine, before reported. Ruffe discharged. ORPHANS' COURT. Jacob A. Christy, Esq., was appointed Auditor to distribute balance in hands of Joseph Rotrock, Executor of Robert C. Gallaher, deceased, as shown by his fifth partial account.

David Wilson was appointed guardian of Ellen A. Wilson, minor child of Jane M. Wilson, deceased. A. J. Patterson, Esq., was appointed guardian of J. F. C. J., Henry G., Thomas A., and James Patterson, minor children of said A. J. Patterson. I. D. Wallis, Esq., guardian, was empowered to sell the interest of his ward, A. G. Gingrich, minor child of Mary A. Gingrich, in a house and lot in Thompsonstown borough.

The bond of G. S. Mills, guardian, for the sale of the real estate of his ward, was approved by the Court. E. S. Doty, Jr., Esq., was appointed Auditor to distribute funds in the hands of Benjamin D. Kepner, Executor of Jacob Frankhouser, deceased. The sale of the mansion tract of the real estate of R. W. Jamison, deceased, to Mrs. Sarah Jamison for \$3,550, was confirmed.

QUARTER SESSIONS. Henry Laever was allowed to resign as supervisor in Walker township, and Jacob Smith was appointed. The petition of David Cunningham and Andrew Shorter, their Attorney B. F. Burdfield, represented that they had held over, and wished to resign as Overseers of Poor of Milford township. Resignation accepted, and David Partner and Lewis Burdfield, who had been elected at the February election, were appointed. In the matter of the rule of the Commissioners, to show cause why a mandamus should not issue, to compel them to build a bridge across Tascara Creek, near Spruce Hill School House, the papers in the case were taken home by Judge Junkin.
