Letter from Fort Wayne, Indiana.

FORT WAYNE, Ind., May 31, 1878. Mr. Editor-Dear Sir: The defeat of the allied tribes at Tippecanoe crippled the Indians to such an extent that they never succeeded in making another decided stand against the whites, excepting the Miamias, who were attacked and helplessly defeated by Lieutenant John B. Campbell, on the Mississinewa river in 1812. Slowly and surely they gave way to the steady steppings of that people who were destined to sow the seeds of Christiany and Civilization where once they dwelt in all the nobleness of their savage nature, which, although not exactly commendable, yet it is with feelings of pity and regret that the student of their history views their pitiable and sad fate. Long and bitter was the struggle that ensued before they left defenceless the graves of their fathers. Strong in the conviction that their title to this great land was a "fee simple" one, perpetual in its grant, and stamped with the approval of the "Great Spirit," whose children they were, is it any wonder that they sought to retaliate on those who had invaded the sacred precincts of their wigwams? who had robbed and murdered their fathers when under the influence of that sidemon " which their "hellish" designs ? We answer in the language of Logan-Ro; when he came to my house and was hungry, I fed him; when he came cold and naked, I clothed him; but, scrpent-like, when I held him to my bosom until warmed to life, he turned and stung me." "Never," says Jefferson, "will I forget those mournful words, "Who is there to mourn for Logan ?"
