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Re-Union of the Juniata County Veterans.

The Juniata county citizen soldiers who passed through the great contest between the North and the South held their first Re-Union to-day, in the Court House.

At ten o'clock the Newport, Perry county, Band, in Uniform, arrived, and at the head of a long procession of veterans marched to the Court House, where, after discoursing some music, the meeting was called to order by Col. J. K. Robinson, by the military order—"Attention!"

DIED: VAN-ORNER—On the 10th inst., in Fayette township, Mary E., daughter of Levi Van-Orner, aged about 25 years.

On motion it was resolved that all names not on the list just read be added.

The names of Joseph Habler, Joseph Smacer and Luke Davis were announced.

Captain H. H. Wilson moved to reconsider the motion to take or receive all the names, by substituting a motion to receive the names of the soldiers present from the hands of the secretary to be read in convention, after noon.

The secretary read the report of the committee on Permanent Organization. President, Major L. E. Atkinson; Vice Presidents, Col. J. K. Robinson, Sergeant S. S. Wilson; Secretary, Captain Lewis Deagan; Corresponding Secretary, T. D. Garman; Chaplain, Rev. H. C. Shindle.

Report received and committee discharged. The President on taking the chair delivered a short address, after which the meeting was declared ready for business. The first business was the enrollment of members and visitors. On motion it was resolved that a report be made for visitors. A recess of 10 minutes was taken in order to give time to all honorably discharged soldiers to hand in their names to the Secretary.

The chair announced that a parade of comrades will take place at 1 o'clock, p. m., and requested all to meet at the south side of the Court House at that hour, and that those who had horses should come mounted as cavalry.

After recess, the band having gone out, the comrades sang the popular songs "Marching Through Georgia" and "The Battle Cry of Freedom." The singing of the latter song caused the entire assembly to rise to their feet.

The President requested that every comrade have his name enrolled so that they may be filed among the archives of the county.

Captain McCallan was requested to organize a group of thirty comrades to preserve order during the afternoon and evening sessions, and to see to it that the front seats in the room be reserved for the comrades.

Dr. Grubb appeared by the comrades to see to it that a complete list of all the soldiers of Juniata county, living and dead, be made out and placed in the archives of the county.

Comrade Kreider suggested that a committee of two in each township be appointed to secure a complete list by townships.

Major Howell said we are making history for those who are to follow, for posterity.

Comrade Beidler suggested that the lists be made out and presented at the next reunion.

Lieutenant Barton approved of all the suggestions, and would further suggest that regular books be obtained for the purpose of putting the list in a substantial and convenient form.

On motion Comrade T. A. Elder was elected Treasurer.

Tax President stated the importance of securing a complete list for record, and suggested a committee be appointed to secure the desired end.

On motion the President authorized to appoint a committee to devise a plan to complete the enrollment of comrades by the Chair.

The Chair appointed the following comrades as the committee: J. D. Howell, L. B. Davis, W. H. Moore, F. N. Grubb, W. H. Groninger. Adjourned to two o'clock, p. m.

Afternoon. As per programme the procession was formed at 1 o'clock on Bridge street, on the south side of the Court House, which, when completed marched through the streets of the Newport and Mifflintown bands.

At 1 1/2 past 2 o'clock the Chairman called the convention to order and enjoined quietness on the part of the audience, and hoped that the requests of the guards would be respected.

Music by the Newport band; prayer by Rev. E. E. Barry; vocal music by the audience, "The Battle Cry of Freedom"—an address of welcome by T. D. Garman. The President announced that some comrades were laid low by the war, and he asked that a collection be taken. He named Spate Kreider, Luke Davis, Kelly Stamp, Dr. Elder, Dr. Brazer, committee on the floor, and Comrade H. A. Stambaugh to take up a collection in the gallery, and while the collection was being taken the Juniata Cornet Band enlivened the meeting with music.

Address by Comrade John T. Nourse. The conclusion of Mr. Nourse's address was greeted with warm applause. Music by the Newport band. Responses from absent comrades. Letter from Sergeant R. H. Patterson read by Secretary T. D. Garman, and asked to be enrolled as a member.

Letter from Mij. General Winfield Hancock. His name was cleared. T. D. Garman, W. M. Gregg, F. E. H. proposed 3 cheers for General Gregg, which were given with a hearty good will. Dispatch from Governor John F. Hartranft expressing regret of his inability to attend, expresses his best wishes. Letter from Col. G. F. McFarland.

Letter from Col. J. G. Elder. Letters, humorous letters, purporting to have come from ex-Senator Simon Cameron, and Elwin M. Stanton, deceased, to John Hollibaugh, in regard to his valorous conduct in holding Bixler's Gap, in the Long Narrows between this place and Lewistown.

Letter from I. Newton Ritter. The President called for the report of the committee, appointed in the morning session to devise a plan for the enrollment of a complete record of all of the soldiers that entered the service of the Government against rebellion.

Comrade Grubb, chairman, read the report. It provides for the appointment of two soldiers in each township to take out a complete "descriptive list" of all the soldiers that entered the service.

It provides for a complete roll of all living and dead soldiers, where living, or where buried.

It provides for the furnishing of blanks for the committees, and 1 for such books and documents as may be necessary to get up a complete record to be kept in the archives of the county in the Court House. It provides that the names of two
