STATE ITEMS.

An eagle that measured six feet four inches from tip to tip was shot recently in Fulton county.

At the February election the people of Northtown shall decide whether that place shall be a city.

Residents of the county seat of Sullivan don't have to go far for deer.

Lewis Cooper, of York county, Pa., was crushed to death last week by a tree falling on him.

Charles Ross' father says he has examined over three hundred lost children in his search for his boy, and that he still has detectives employed to find him.

At Johnston on Monday morning a week Andrew Mullin, aged 10, while playing near the railroad track stepped in front of an express train and was instantly killed.

Thirty soldiers of the Grand Army posts of the State will attend Garfield's inauguration.

William N. Intyre, aged thirteen, son of a truck foreman at Haldimandburg, rolled off a lounge in his father's house on the 15th and fell on the point of a rusty bayonet with which he was playing.
