Be it enacted by the Schale and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all citizens of the United States, who are, or shall be otherwise qualified to vote at any election by the propole in any State. Terrielection by the people, in any State, Terri-tory, district, county, city, parish, town-

ship, school district, municipality or other territorial subdivisions, shall be entitled and allowed to vote at all such elections without distinction of race, color, or previous con-dition of servitude, any Constitution, law, custom, usage or regulation of any State, Territory, or by, or under its authority to the contrary notwithstanding.
SECTION 2. And be if further enacted, That if, by or under the authority of the Con-stitution or laws of any State, or the laws
