The Commissioners of Pensions at Washington, estimates that \$75,000,000 will be needed to the pension claims this year.

"The Commission appointed by the last legislature to count and compute the vote for State Treasurer completed its work at Harrisburg on the 19th inst. The vote has been announced as follows: Matthew Stanley Quay, 324,694; Conrad B. Day, 281,178; Barr Spangler, 13,047; W. D. Whitney, 2,783.

A new rich gold field has been discovered in the eastern portion of the Republic of Honduras, about one hundred and fifty miles from the Atlantic coast. Good, steady working, economic habits constitute a gold mine for the owner of such qualities. Will gold fall in price in consequence of the millions to be mined in Honduras?

BLISMARK proposes to drive the Poles from Prussia, his plan is to buy them out and compel them to leave the country. He says that it will cost the government \$75,000,000 to buy their estates. He does not propose that the government should retain the purchased estates, but advocates that the estates that have been bought from the Poles shall be sold to Germans.

Nor long ago Bulgaria and Serbia were at war. The more powerful governments of Europe put an end to the fight by intervention. In the settlement of the trouble it is proposed to take a slice of territory that contains one hundred thousand Greeks and annex them to Bulgaria. Greece protests, and says that she will fight before so many of her people shall be put under Bulgarian rule. Both England and Germany are pressing Greece to submit. — war may be the result.

The Congressional report of the Fortification Board proposes for the defense of Philadelphia: Ten breech-loading 12-inch 50-ton rifles; five breech-loading 10-inch 27-ton rifles; five breech-loading 8-inch 13-ton rifles, and sixteen 12 inch rifled mortars. The estimate for defenses at Philadelphia, exclusive of armament, is as follows: Casemates armor 4,850 \$1,300,000; structural metal, 650 tons, \$133,000; cost of masonry and earth, \$832,000; total, \$2,262,000. Add to this the cost of armament and mounting of guns and mortars, \$282,000; cost of carriages, 274,000, total, \$1,192,000; the total for submarine mines, \$114,000, and the six torpedo boats, \$364,000, and we have a grand total for Philadelphia of \$3,838,000.

Wheat in Illinois.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—A despatch to the Times from Springfield, Illinois, says: The forthcoming report of the State Agricultural Department on the amount of wheat raised and consumed during the year 1885 will show a condition of affairs not known to exist for the past twenty-five years, there being a deficit in the crop of \$5,000,000 bushels. The average harvested was 1,068,364. The amount annually required for seed and consumption is 13,739,029 bushels, but the amount produced, as shown by the returns, was 8,299,243. Of the one hundred and two counties in the State, only twenty-five report a surplus in production over the demands for seed and consumption. These counties are not located in any particular belt, but scattered throughout the State indiscriminately.

Notwithstanding the fact that the wheat crop of last summer in the United States has been the shortest ever harvested in many years the price of wheat is low. The unprofitable price at which wheat is selling is owing to the foreign markets being supplied. A few years ago it was the boast of British statesmen, that Great Britain will develop the raising of wheat in India, under the cheap labor system that country where farm hands may be secured at two and three cents per day and board themselves, and then they can control the markets of the world by underselling the American farmer. In their boast they declare that they will sell wheat in America at forty cents per bushel, this may be British bluster, but the fact that wheat has been lower in Europe this winter than in America awakens in the mind of the American agriculturalist an apprehension, that perhaps all that the British have been saying about wheat culture may be true. Such a reduction in the price of wheat would result in a great change. The price of everything would be reduced accordingly, wages, salaries, taxes, everything would be re-adjusted to comply with the forced new order of things. British interests in India are detrimental to American interests at home.
