Stilton Cheese.

The rich imported cheese known as Stilton is made in England in a narrow locality in the county of Leicester. It was made by a Mrs. Paulet for an inn keeper named Cooper Thornhill, and in compliance with his directions. The cheese is now one of the most popular of all English makes, and has a rich, delicate flavor, due to a peculiar proc of making and ripening. It is made of the whole morning's milk, to which is added the cream of the previous night's milk. The milk is warmed to only seventy-eight degrees, and is curdled at that temperature with a small quantity of rennet. The curd is cut in large blocks, and is dipped out into cylindrical molds about eight inches in diameter and ten or eleven inches deep. The only pressure applied is the weight of the curd, as the mold is reversed daily, so that the pressure of the cheese presse out the whey. The curing is perfected by means of a blue and green mould, which is caused to penetrate through the cheese by pricking the curd with a long needle first pushed into an old cheese, by which the new cheese is in-oculated with the ferment. Two years are required to complete the curing. The cheese sells in England at about
