The Republican Primary Election held on Saturday was a laudable one. The return judges met in the Court House on Monday afternoon and transmitted their business in a quiet and expeditious manner.

Wm. M. Allison was elected President of the Convention. J. H. Wilson and J. T. Mator were Secretaries.

The following named old time prominent Republicans and returned: Cunningham—Philip Pennaker, Fayette—Samuel Kelly, Mifflintown—Wm. Allison, Delaware—A. C. Henckels, Belle—Daniel Kaufman, Easton—George Wilson, Middleburg—S. H. Deberg, York—D. G. Shellenbarger, Monroe—George Neffler, Philadelphia—Ed Davis, Williams—J. S. Weaver.

The County Commissioner, Francis Hower received 491 votes; John H. Cunningham received 445; W. L. Moore received 433 votes; W. N. Stewart received 368 votes.

For County Treasurer, D. G. Shellenbarger received 510 votes; John Hower received 425 votes; J. C. Cook received 189 votes; John McLaughlin received 144 votes.

For Prothonotary, Theodore H. Seminger received 545 votes; Albert T. Will received 341 votes; J. F. Ankler, W. P. Graham received 846 votes; Nat. C. Henckels received 836 votes.

For Representative Delegate, W. H. H. Adams received 877 votes; J. H. Wilson received 833 votes.

They having been an unanimous vote for a candidate for District Attorney, F. M. Russell was nominated for a full term and was elected by the same action by acclamation.
