Issue of Bank Checks

Judge Mills of Philadelphia, declares his opinion which is not favorable to the non-acceptance of bank checks by Pennsylvania, but to every man who has dealings with banks or who receives checks in payment of either goods or bills, made, or for any other purpose. The case was the State National Bank of New York against Abraham Wolf, and it was a rule for judgment for want of sufficient affidavit of opinion.

The judge took a lengthy opinion concludes by saying:

The rule, therefore, is well established in the two greatest commercial cities of the world, that a check on a bank where all the parties are residents of the same city, must be presented on the day upon which it bears date, or on the next day, and if not, the risk of the solvency of the drawee is upon the payee. We think that rule should be applied to this case, there being no circumstances to except it from its operation and that the delay in the presentation of the check was unreasonable. The defendant is not responsible for its non-payment. The rule for judgment is discharged.—Exchange.

Once a Gigantic Project.

The canal which was the first and largest project of the American continent, having been suggested by William Penn in 1699, and its route surveyed seventy years later, before there was a canal in operation in England, is to be sold. The route on the canal was surveyed by David Rittenhouse, the astronomer, and Dr. William Smith, Professor of the University of Pennsylvania, in 1792. It extended from the Schuylkill river, near Reading, to the Susquehanna, at the present site of Middletown, Dauphin county. It was the first link in a proposed chain of water communication between the Delaware river and Lake Erie, a project so gigantic that early day, when canals and even turnpikes were unknown, that the projectors were believed by the people to be crazy.
