The McVeystown Steam mill owned by Moore, McWilliams & Co., was discovered to have a fire at 1 o'clock A. M., on Tuesday the 3rd inst. A sledding party returning from the county gave the first alarm, but the flames had gained too much headway, and all hope of saving the mill property was abandoned. The fire was fierce and hot and in a short time the large structure was completely enveloped in flames. A small house unoccupied, owned by J. R. Witt, took fire and burned, also a stable in the rear. J. R. Witt's residence was subjected to intense heat and the shutters next to the mill were destroyed, also part of the yard fence. If it had not been for snow on the roofs and the kindness of the night one half the town would have been in ashes. There was about 200 bushels of wheat, 200 bushels of oats, 250 bushels of corn and a ton of chop in the mill. No insurance on the building or contents. Loss about \$5,000. Squire Witt's loss is about \$700. Part insured. The origin of the fire is a mystery. The miller, Mr. Isenberg says the fire was out in the evening, and the mill was left in the morning, and this is where the flames were first discovered.—Journal.
