Neal Dow's Defeat.

Neal Dow was nominated for Mayor of Portland, Maine, by a little knot of people numbering less than a hundred, who did not have the slightest idea that he would be elected. Then he was perfunctorily recommended by the Democrats who refrained, however, from inducing him as their candidate. As Mr. Dow is now eighty-five years of age, few voters believed that he was a serious candidate, or that he could discharge the duties of the office acceptably, if elected. His defeat was therefore, inevitable.—Maine paper.

EMERSON WILLIAM of Germany, died last Friday morning about 8 o'clock. Had he lived till the 22 day of March he would have been 91 years old. He reigned 28 years, and as a soldier, fought out outside scenes of the states into a solid Imperial government. His wife the Empress sat by his side and held his hand as he breathed his last. His last words were indicative of the soldiers' religion and passion, and were, "I am a man of peace, but if Russia forces me to war, I shall faithfully side with my ally, Austria." His son the Crown Prince has succeeded him under the title of Frederick the III, but as the Crown Prince is not capable of serving on account of a serious diseased throat, his eldest son William, aged about 28 years, will manage the affairs of state. There is a world of trouble on hand for the young man, but if he has the faith, and is a capable soldier like his fathers, hell get through.

The Knights of Labor in the Schuylkill coal region are at last beginning to open their eyes. The result of this operation is that they are coming to a realization of the fact that they have been egregiously fooled. One of the assemblies in that region has passed a resolution declaring that the strike against the Reading Railroad Company was not only advised and badly managed, but entered into "blindly and without cause." The Assembly has therefore surrendered its charter and it is believed that others will follow suit. So suddenly are the pig headed fools who have led the men into this strife that they will refuse to strike off. As a consequence the poor fellows who now see themselves ruled out of work are anxious to put an end to the series of blunders which they have been forced to commit by virtue of their connection with the Knights of Labor. It is not therefore surprising to learn that there is a probability of the disintegration of the order in the coal region. If this should turn out to be the case, the men would derive benefit all from this late strike. There would be no greater blessing for them in the long run than the dissolution of an organization which crushes out their individual will and which subjects them to almost despotic authority of damages, knaves and scoundrels.
