CORRECTION.

Presbyterians on Temperance.

Huntingdon Presbytery at its meeting last week, at Bellefonte passed the following resolutions:

Resolved, That presbytery express its commendation and grateful recognition of the self-sacrificing and efficient work of the members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Resolved, That pastors be requested to preach to their congregations and exhort them to the work of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Resolved, That so far as possible members use their influence as Christian citizens to secure the election to office of such as are members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Resolved, That the presbytery recommends the organization of temperance societies in the Synodical churches.

Resolved, That we endorse the principle of constitutional prohibition and pray for the successful solution of the question to the people.

of the State. Resolved, That the presbytery reiterates its former deliverance on the subject of temperance, and declares that the signing of applications for licenses and the bonds of applicants, by members of the Presbyterian church, is inconsistent with their duty as church members and subjects them to discipline.

District Conference.

At a conference held in Lewistown, Pa., on Tuesday, March 13th, 1888, composed of three representatives from each of the counties of Franklin, Juniata, Mifflin, Snyder, Union, Huntingdon and Fulton not being represented by the Eighteenth Congressional District, for the purpose of forming a plan for the nomination of Congressmen under the new apportionment, it was decided that the present plan of three congressmen from each county be continued.

As delegates to the Republican National Convention are elected in the same manner in which Congressmen are nominated, it was further decided that Thursday, April 19th, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M., be the time and Lewistown, Pa., the place, for holding the conference to elect two persons as delegates to represent the said Eighteenth Congressional District in the Republican National Convention at Chicago on June 19th, 1888, and one person as Presidential Elector to represent said district in the Electoral College. Each county in the district is requested to send three delegates to said conference at Lewistown, Pa. A. NEVIN FOREMAN, President.
