At a conference held in Lewistown, Pa., on Tuesday, March 13th, 1888, composed of three representatives from each of the counties of Franklin, Juniata, Mifflin, Snyder, Union, (Huntington and Fulton not being represented) of the Eighteenth Congressional District, for the purpose of formulating a plan for the nomination of Congressman under the new apportionment, it was decided that the present plan of three conferences from each county be continued, as delegates to the Republican National Convention are elected in the same manner in which Congressmen are nominated, it was further decided that Thursday, April 19th, 1888, at 2 o'clock p.m., be the time and place of the conference.
